ANNUAL REPORT 1950-51

*YOUR EXCELLENCY, YOUR HIGHNESS,
LADIES & GENTLEMEN,

I have great pleasure in placing before you the report of the working of Loyola College during the past year. It has been a happy and an important year, marking a prominent milestone in the history of the college, the 25th anniversary of its foundation. When celebrating the Silver Jubilee in October last, we took the occasion to review the past and found the retrospect encouraging. The affection of our Old Boys, the sympathy of the public of Madras, the generous tributes paid us by so many distinguished men, who made it a point to attend the various functions of the Jubilee, greatly heartened us. I make but a passing reference to the Jubilee here, because all that I could say, and much more than that, has already been said and most of it printed in the Jubilee Souvenir just published.

The results of the University examinations held in March 1950 have not yet been publicly reviewed. I therefore summarise them briefly. Our results in B.A., B.Sc. and B.Com. were as good as usual and in some cases better than in previous years, averaging 84% passes and a large number of first and second classes. In B.Sc., Physics two of our students stood 1st and 2nd in the University, S. Sankaran securing

the Jagirdar of Arni Gold Medal. The Honours results were on the whole somewhat below expectations, at least in the number of first classes, though in every branch, except for one failure in M.A. Mathematics, we secured cent per cent passes. In the Intermediate, however we have broken several records. We sent up 442 students, the largest number ever sent up by any college in the University; secured 389 passes, again the largest number, working out at 88%. There were in all 265 first classes, and absolute University record, 203 in the First Group alone; while in Natural Science, out of 60 students, the first batch sent up by this college, 35 secured first classes, another University record.

In a way we are afraid of these results. They attract so many applications at the reopening; that the mere physical problem of dealing with the piles of application forms and the crowds that besiege the Principal's Office, is becoming insuperable. There are just 900 seats available in the junior classes every year. Last year there were more than 4000 applicants for these seats and not one of them would take a refusal. It is this heavy pressure that prevents us from reducing our numbers, which now stand at over 1800, to manageable proportions. Large numbers do not conduce to discipline

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and efficiency, much less to individual character formation which should be the prime purpose of any educational institution. For these reasons it has long been the wish of our religious superiors that numbers should be curtailed. Though it may be unwelcome to some ears, I have to announce that, in the interests of the very students we admit from the next academic year, a determined move will be made to bring our numbers down to more reasonable figures.

Two new courses were introduced in our curriculum this year: the B. Sc. in Botany with Chemistry and Zoology as subsidiaries, and the B.A. in Latin. Our recognition in B.Sc. Botany is the logical sequel of taking up the Natural Science group in Intermediate, and it was made easy because of the presence of Fr. A. Rapinat, S.J., who has had long experience in managing a similar department in St. Joseph's College, Tiruchirapalli. The B.A. in Latin is an expansion of our recognition in Group V, and is in keeping with the traditional devotion Jesuits have always had for the study of the classics.

Among our ordinary activities, one that proceeds unobtrusively, but deserves special mention, is Chemical Research. The work done by the research section of the Chemistry Department under the able direction of Fr. Yeddanapalli has been described at some length in an article in the Silver Jubilee Souvenir, so I omit any description here. The results obtained during the past two years have already been published in several scientific journals, and the more recent work was presented in the form of three

papers at the Bangalore session of the Indian Science Congress. At present there are seven students in the research section, two of whom are receiving research stipends from the Council of Scientific and Industrial Research, New Delhi; two others hold research studentships from the University of Madras. We should like to secure stipends for all the research scholars. I am particularly happy to place on record the generous gift of equipment sent to us by Mr. W. F. Hoffman, Jr., Vice-President of the Irvington Varnish and Insulator Company, Irvington, U.S.A., to enable us to carry on fundamental work on cashew-nut shell liquid. While I am on this subject, I may mention that this year we are also conducting the M.Sc. Course in Physical Chemistry for the Madras University.

The Mathematics Department has every reason to be proud this year. The Head of the Department, Fr. C. Racine, S.J., was accorded the singular honour of being elected President of the Mathematics Section of the Indian Science Congress. At the recent Bangalore Session he delivered his Presidential Address on "Topological Methods in Analysis". He is besides at present the only professor from a college helping to conduct the M.Sc. course in Mathematics in the University.

The following are the important changes in the staff during the current year. At the outset Fr. J. Adisayam, S.J., Professor of Politics and Vice-Principal, was transferred to St. Joseph's College Tiruchirapalli. Fr. Adisayam has been associated with Loyola College

for eleven years, during which time his responsibilities were gradually increased. He was appointed Vice-Principal in 1946, and had to shoulder for long stretches of time the management of the college during the enforced absences of the Principal, Fr. J. D'Souza, S.J., in Delhi and abroad. Fr. Adisayam was respected by all as a religious with a high sense of duty and of impartial justice, with a large fund of sympathy and understanding who always gave of his best, whether in the class-room or in the field of administration. It was inevitable that St. Joseph's which has been generous to Loyola in recent years in providing several members of our religious staff, should be recompensed, and the choice fell on Fr. Adisayam. We parted with him reluctantly. I wish to record officially how deeply Loyola College is indebted to him, while we wish him as distinguished and useful a term of service in St. Joseph's.

The gap created by Fr. Adisayam's transfer was temporarily filled by Fr. Yeddanapalli, who graciously consented to accept the tiresome duties of Vice-Principal in addition to his heavy work as Head of the Chemistry Department. He was relieved in the Second Term by Fr. A. Vachaparambil, S. J., who combines the posts of Assistant Warden of the Hostel and Vice-Principal of the College. This dual appointment has been interpreted by some students as a subtle move of the authorities to curb their tendencies to roam, by co-ordinating the discipline of College and Hostel. Perhaps they are right.

Another important change that has just taken place is the going-on-leave in the New Year of our Principal, Fr. J.D'Souza, S.J. He has been so frequently absent in the past that we may not realise our loss immediately. However, when I say that it is quite in the realm of possibilities that he might not return there is no one who will not sympathise with us. I refrain for the moment from paying him any tribute, however small, for the incalculable good that he has done to Loyola College, for the simple reason that he is still the administrative head of the institution, and we fondly hope that when the present assignment is over which he has taken up at the bidding of his religious superiors, he will yet return to guide our destinies once more.

A word about our various extra-curricular activities. We have been very fortunate this year in securing many speakers of distinction both at home and abroad to address the various college associations. The Hon'ble Justices A. S. P. Iyer, Basheer Ahmed Sayeed and Chandrasekharan, Drs. Achyutha Menon and P. V. Cherian, have addressed the Debating Club and various language associations. The Economics Association had the pleasure of hearing Dr. Alagappa Chettiar, Mr. Kothari, Sir R. K. Shanmukham Chettiar, Dr. P. S. Loganathan, Sir C. P. Ramaswamy Iyer, and the Hon'ble Sri Harekrishna Mahtab, Union Minister of Commerce and Industries. The Science Associations have been privileged in being able to invite several foreign experts.

Mention must be made of Prof. J. D. Bernal, F. R. S. of London University, who spoke on "X-Ray technique in Science and Industry", of Prof. and Mrs. Louis F. Fieser of Harvard University, who gave a lecture on "Cholesterol and the Cancer Problem", and of Dr. Gregor Wentzel of the Institute for Nuclear studies of Chicago University, who gave an address on "Elementary Particles, their properties and interactions".

Our student debaters have won a number of prizes: the Kasturi Ranga Iyengar Memorial Cup in the Y. M. I. A. Debate held in the city, together with the first prize awarded to C. Rangarajan as the best speaker and the C. V. Raman Challenge Cup for the second place, at the contest held at the Y.M.C.A. in Bangalore, with a special prize awarded to M. Mathias. They have been no less proficient in Hindi than in English. N. Chandrasekhara Senoy was awarded a cup as the best speaker in the Hindi elocution contest conducted by the Y.M.I.A., and our association was awarded another cup for the best dramatic performance in the Museum Theatre on Deepavali Day.

The N.C.C. has been functioning as efficiently and enthusiastically as ever, thanks to the painstaking selfless work of its Officers. Last summer Capt. T. Murugaiyan followed a six weeks course of training with the 2nd Travancore Infantry at Fort St. George, fully equipping himself for the command of our company. Recruitment from the juniors was more than satisfactory, so many

applying that a judicious selection could be made. This factor, together with intensive training from the beginning of July, made for a smart turn-out on every occasion that the N. C. C. was asked to provide a Guard of Honour parade. The Cadre Camp in September was attended by 2 officers and 40 men. All the twelve cadets presented for the certificate examinations passed, S.U./O. R. G. Micetich and U/O T. K. Panchapakesan coming first and second in the Battalion. At the annual camp in December attended by 3 officers and 130 men, we won 2 competitions and narrowly missed winning the other 4, in all of which we were the runners up. Out of the 20 students sent to represent the 1st Madras Bn. N.C.C., at the Republic Day celebrations in New Delhi this month, 5 were chosen from Loyola College.

Our sporting activities have been pursued with the philosopher's moderation in success. We generally manage to get to the semi-finals in the various tournaments and then lose to the Medicals. We are now in the Semi-finals of the Football League where we have to meet the Medicals. We have already met them in the semi-finals of the Hockey League and drawn three consecutive games without coming to a decision. In the Cricket League Loyola and Medicals had the maximum number of points in their zone. In the Basketball League we are again in the semi-finals, but this time against the Stanley Medicals. In Tennis we came to the top of our zone and lost to Law, the winner of the other zone. The finals of most of the Tournaments

are yet to be played. We have won the Stokes Shield again in the Hockey Knock-out Tournament. If we total up all the matches played in the various League Tournaments—Cricket, Hockey, Football, Tennis and Basketball and omitting Volleyball—we have won 18 matches, drawn 5 and lost 3. I purposely omit Volleyball because we have been consistent in losing all our matches in Volleyball, except for one still inexplicable slip when we beat Polytechnics.

In the Inter-Divisional Finals for both Hockey and Football our Teams were the winners.

The Madras University Athletic Team which competed in the Inter-University Tournament was captained by Henry Rebello. It will be recalled that the Madras Team carried off the trophy by scoring 51 points, with a safe margin of 20 points over the second in rank. Shiva Reddy and M. Mathias were members of the team. Rangaswamy had to be dropped unfortunately at the last moment owing to a strained muscle.

Tennis in its various forms of hard court, tennicoit and table tennis has continued to be extremely popular. The tennis courts are insufficient to meet the demand. Fortunately we have had no headaches this year with regard to the supply of Slazenger Tennis balls. Cricket practice at the nets has been fairly regular, though whether it is correct to call the blind 'swiping' that goes on there cricket 'practice' is more than debateable. An additional field is being brought in use for cricket; but owing to the failure

of rains we have not had an opportunity for giving it the necessary rolling. A. G. Kripal Singh was chosen as a member of the University Cricket team.

People often ask us when we shall ever stop building, and look quite incredulous when we answer that the one thing we detest more than any other is to start a new building. In the last few years, in spite of the war and the consequent restrictions, we have been victims of an unprecedented spate of building within our premises. The large Chemistry Laboratory in use now for 3 years, the still larger library and Bertram Assembly Hall, which we have been able to enjoy only this year, and the two new blocks in the Hostel, with their appendages of mess rooms, bath rooms, and the like, not to mention the new servants' quarters, are evident witnesses of it. All this is due to the far-sighted wisdom of the Rector and Principal at the time, Fr. J. D'Souza, as well as to the financial assistance of both central and provincial governments.

The total amount of scholarships and fee remissions granted in this college amounts to over Rs. 50,000 a year. The greater part of this sum is made up of educational concessions granted by Government both Central and Provincial; and a small amount comes from private charitable funds; but a substantial sum of over Rs. 20,000 has been granted this year alone by the Management of the College directly in scholarships and fee concessions. We are happy to bear this burden in order to help poor and deserving students to pursue their studies;

but it will necessarily hamper progress in other directions.

It now remains for me to thank all those responsible for the good the College has been able to achieve this year. First of all our thanks go up to God for the good health and the general happiness and good spirit which have prevailed. My thanks are also due to our devoted staff. Loyola College has a tradition of unselfish service on the part of its staff. It was well known in the early days when I was a student here, more than 20 years ago. It remains a patent reality today. Without their genuine loyalty and unstinted labour, the College would never have been able to achieve anything. No poor words of mine can ever express our heartfelt thanks and deep appreciation.

Next, I must thank the students, especially the officials of the College Societies, the class monitors, the delegates of the Hostel Messes, the captains of the various teams, and the whole rank and file, for their splendid spirit. We love to speak of them all as "our boys", and I believe they like it too, and it is this spirit of filial affection that makes our relation so easy and pleasant. A short while ago I was asked to submit a report to the education department on the incidence of strikes in this college and the action taken. That was the shortest report I have ever made in my life: it consisted of the single word, "Nil". We are proud of our boys and are confident that they will always merit our praise both

while they are in college and later on in life. I cannot let this occasion pass without thanking also the parents of our students for their co-operation, as well as all our friends, especially those who have honoured us with their presence here today.

Finally, I must thank your Excellency and Your Highness most sincerely for consenting to preside over this function and give away the prizes. We had hoped that you would have been able to inaugurate the Silver Jubilee Celebrations in October, but prior engagements prevented your accepting our invitation. We were doubly anxious to make sure of your presence to-day, so that Your Excellencies might be publicly associated with the College in the year of its Silver Jubilee. Ever since you came to Madras, you have taken an affectionate interest in Loyola College, which has been both gratifying and encouraging to us. We are deeply grateful for your kindness and if I may be forgiven an impertinence, we are even more deeply grateful for the splendid example Your Excellencies afford to the people of this province both young and old. Combining in yourselves the hoary traditions and old world courtesy of an ancient princely family with sterling personal virtues, your very life in our midst is an inspiring lesson of what the younger generation ought to aspire to be. In thanking you once again I beg to be allowed to express our sincere prayer for God's blessings on you and yours.

CHRONICLE

What with the Jubilee Souvenir and the Principal's exhaustive Report there is very little left for the Chronicler to underline.

Early in January Father D'Souza left us to take up an assignment committed to him by our Father General in Rome. He is now in Poona organizing an Indian Institute of Social Order with the help of a few distinguished Jesuit writers from Calcutta, Shembaganur and Ahmedabad. It is hoped that this Institute will later develop into a School of Social Science, providing lectures for workers and those interested in social order. A further step, depending on the response the School meets with, would be the affiliation to a University so that the course might be thrown open to a wider public with the official sanction of a University Diploma.

Fr. Gordon, our Rector, is at present acting as Principal till the June rush for admissions, when he will assume the full responsibility.

The 'Last Vows' of Fr. Gordon were solemnly taken on Aug. 15th. The event was celebrated by a pleasant function of music and song. Fr. Basenach played an *Allegro* by J. H. Fiocco, our scholastic Mathematics student, C. Valles S. J., revealed unsuspected talent on the piano with a *Sonata* by B. Marcello. The Choir was in full throat with a *Hunting Song* by Weber, conducted by Fr. Amescua. There were greetings in prose and in verse by Fr. S. Mascarenhas, Mr. Kunju Paulo, Mr. Arokiasamy and Fr. Murphy. Our old Hussey (be care-

ful, printer, with the spelling) sent down a delightful poem from Yercaud, reminiscent of the old days. The Brothers of St. Gabriel contributed a concerted item and there was also a Tamil song both of which were warmly applauded.

In November an invitation was sent out to the Catholic Colleges and Schools of Madras to join with us in celebrating the newly defined dogma of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Loyola College provided a sort of Heaviside layer of essays, dogmatic and historical. The picturesque side was presented by a variety of striking tableaux, staged by the Presentation Convents from George Town, Vepery and Church Park and the Bon Secours Convent. The deaf mutes from the Priory convent acted, as only the mutes know how to act with perfection, the *Salve Regina*. Miss. Leela Rosalind, whose voice we have heard on many gramophone records, gave a Tamil Hymn; the Choir of St. Bede's school contributed a song. Miss. Ida Rodrigues *Ave Maria* by Gounod, and the students of Stella Maris College's Chorus were two of the sweetest items. Miss. Hema Mallini's graceful dance was very greatly appreciated.

Also in November the Catholic University Federation held their regional conference in Loyola. There were some excellent papers by Mr. Dorairaj, the well known Advocate of Mylapore, by Miss. Monica Sen, student of the

Presidency College and by Mr. Kuriakose, Research student of Loyola. Musical Interludes were provided by Miss. Margaret Paul of Stella Maris College on the piano and our own Roshier with his mouth organ.

The College Sodality and Catholic Students' Union held their annual Academy in February. The President's speech was strikingly original, as might safely have been expected from Mr. G. L. Lobo. These conferences and academies can always be safely expected to unearth hidden musical talent. On this occasion Felix Royan distinguished himself with an accordion solo; Stanley Thomas played the violin and L. Fernandes the guitar.

The Hostel celebrated their Day on a magnificent scale. Tables were laid out in the garden in front of the college. There must have been at least a thousand at tea. Our Collector, Mr. T. S. Ramachandran, was the President of the evening and his witty and amusing speech was one of the most agreeable items of the evening. A very entertaining variety show was put up by the students which kept the party rocking with laughter till nearly 9.0 p.m. The organizers deserve a special vote of thanks.

An editorial committee has now produced for the first time a printed Hostel Annual. In ancient days we used to have a typed monthly sort of

bulletin, that dispensed news, advice, suggestions discreet and otherwise, in a very lordly fashion with a contemptuous disregard for the laws of libel. The Hostel Magazine of 1951 breaks new ground. We welcome it with a big brother's accolade.

The new Bertram Hall has been put to many uses. As an examination hall it is what the French call 'formidable'. Even so it does not accomodate all our students. It is comfortably spacious for our Intermediate Compositions. We tried it, but after a few trials it had to be abandoned; without a microphone and several amplifiers the strain on the voice proved to be excessive. On occasions when various leading industrialists, scientists and politicians have been invited by College Associations we have provided the necessary loud speakers. So far we are not completely satisfied with any of the arrangements. Perhaps when the false ceiling of 'triplex' is put up, there will be an adequate improvement. When the Shakespearean actors came to Madras and aroused such popular enthusiasm, the University arranged for a lecture by Mr. Norman Marshall, the organizing Director of the Company, to be given in the Bertram Hall. The lecture brought home to us another weak point in the Hall. The intermittent drifting in of curious students can be an irksome distraction to the lecturer. It looks as though we shall have to close the gates in future as soon as a serious lecture has begun, to prevent this awkwardness.

The September Tournaments showed us clearly that the Hall is ideal as a Common Room. There were 56 entries for The Principal's Cup for Table-Tennis Singles. With three tables only it was easy to get through the tournament in a few days. The players were free from any pressure from the spectators.

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Congratulations to Mallikeswaran for captaining his football team so successfully to win the Inter—Divisional Finals. This is the first time that Loyola has won the Wilson Cup.

Congratulations also to North. His hockey team brought back the Stokes' Shield and won the Inter—Divisional Trophy: not an unusual thing for our hockey team, as the inscriptions on the Shield will testify.

We lost the Travancore Shield by a few points. The Shield has gone back to Christian College. If K. C. David had not strained a muscle we should have had him for the hurdles and the sprints. It would have made all the difference. He was one of the University Athletes.

It is most unfortunate that the Asian games are taking place just in March at a time when Henry Rebello, the Captain of the University Athletic teams is about to sit for the Final Honours Economics examination. It affects also Shiva Reddi who might have had a chance in the 1,500 metres. He came first with Rangasami a close second in the Inter—Collegiate Sports.

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We note with great satisfaction the names of three of our present staff in the list of successful competitors in the I.A.S. At the same time the obvious corollary should not be overlooked that Colleges can no longer count on a first rate staff in view of the superior attractions offered to their abilities by the various services. Education should be after food and health the first charge on the nation. A second rate staff will give second rate education. The government must come to the rescue of the teachers and see that the educational service is as attractive as any other.

Tamil Sangam

The election of the secretaries of this Sangam was confined this year to those who have taken Tamil as their second language. U. Dakshinamurthy, IV U.C. and K. P. M. Abdul Kader were duly elected.

The Sangam was inaugurated by Dr. M. Varadarajan, M.O.L., Ph. D., Professor of Tamil, Pachiappa's College, on 4-8-1950. Thiru E. K. Natesa Sarma, B.O.L., the permanent President of the Sangam, was in the chair. The speaker emphasised the need for popularising Tamil literature among the common people.

On 8-9-1950 the poet Bharathi's day was celebrated under the presidentship of the grand old Va. Ra., Loyola had the golden opportunity of hearing his revolutionary views. He exhorted the students to cultivate the qualities of emotion, sense, and feeling. Thiru Kothamangalam Subbu entertained the gathering with a vivid life-history of the poet Bharathi.

meritorious services rendered by him to Tamil literature and culture.

During the second week of October our Sangam celebrated "Valluvar's Day". Thiru K. Appaduri, M.A., L.T., (Visarad Hindi) kindly condescended to preside. The president dealt, at great length with the greatness of "Kural". He said that when Shakespeare brought out his works, the period was not ripe enough to understand his greatness. The same condition prevailed in Tamil Nad when the Kural was written. He emphasised that no literature in other Indian languages can be compared to the Kural. Vidwan Anbu Ganapathy of Pachiappa's College gave an impressive lecture, explaining why Valluvar has dealt only with "Agham and Porul" and not with "Veedu".

A debate was conducted on 10th November 1950, in which more than fifteen students took part. Thiru M. S. Srinivasan, I Yr. M. A., and Thiru S. A. Natarajan, IV U.C. were elected to represent our College in the various Tamil debates of the City Colleges.

On 15th January 1951 a meeting was conducted to celebrate the auspicious "Tamil Thirunal" (Pongal Day). This function was largely attended. Thiru N. D. Sundara Vadivel, M.A., presided, and T. P. Meenakshi Sundaranar, M.A., B.L., M.O.L., spoke on the importance of Tamil Thirunal.

The Inaugural address was delivered by Sri P. A. Subramanya Iyer M.A., Retd. Professor of English, of the Annamalai University, on 26th July '50. After a brief introductory speech by the President the learned professor in a lucid style gave an interesting lecture on "The Creation of a Poet" or Kavishrishti.

Explaining at the outset that by Kaviishrishti he meant the creation of poetry, he explained that genuine poetry is the outpouring of a heart filled with emotion, struggling to find an outlet for itself like the lava of a volcano.

The second meeting of the association was held on 10th Aug. '50. Prof. K. V. Subramania Sastry, the President, welcomed the Hon'ble Mr. Justice A. S. P. Iyer M.A., I.C.S.

In his address Mr. Justice Iyer said: "Sanskrit which is one of the greatest ancient languages, need not and should not be made a compulsory language in schools or colleges, but should be studied by those who love it for its own sake." Sanskrit, he added, was one of the seven great languages of the world. So long as they were able to appreciate the beautiful and sublime thoughts expressed through that language, it would live. Politicians would be well advised not to make it compulsory.

Speaking of the beauty of the dramas in Sanskrit Literature, and the grandeur of the epics, he said that Sanskrit was the language of our holy scriptures.

Even the great Tamil writers, he pointed out, had mixed Sanskrit words to add beauty to their language. Finally he suggested that our children should be taught the mother-tongue, the national language, English and Sanskrit.

During the Second Term another meeting was held, on 24th November. Prof. Dr. V. Raghavan, Professor of Sanskrit, Madras University spoke on "Sanskrit and Christianity." Fr. Thekkera presided.

He pointed out that missionary educational institutions in India should evince greater interest in fostering Sanskrit. Missionary education which was based on the foundation of religious belief and spiritual values, had no greater ally on its side than Sanskrit in its task of preserving a religious spirit.

Tracing the history of missionary interest in Sanskrit studies, Dr. Raghavan gave an interesting account of the early Christian missionaries in the matter of Sanskrit education of the 17th Century, which paved the way for the more systematic work of the more celebrated Orientalists of the West and the so-called discovery of Sanskrit. He referred to Fr. Calmette, Abraham Roger of Pulicat, Pere Pons, William Carey of Serampore, Johann Erus Hanxleden, and Fra. Bartholomeo.

The lecturer then described the Sanskrit translations of the Bible by Carey and his colleagues at Serampore and Calcutta.

There were two works in manuscript, related to the Bible, which were cast in proper classic authorship and possessed definite literary merit : the *Krishtugita* of unknown authorship and the *Sulaimaccharitha* of the well-known 16th Century author *Kalyanamalla*. There were also the four chapters inserted, in modern times, in the third book of the *Bhavishya Purana* in the *Venkateswara* Press edition, giving a brief account of the brilliant biblical stories of Noah and Adam and Eve.

Touching critical works in this field, Dr. Raghavan mentioned in particular the *Matapariksha grantha* of *Somanatha*, who wrote (1839) for *Wilkinson*, the British Resident of Nepal. This literature, the lecturer pointed out, showed the adaptability of Sanskrit and the appropriateness with which its rich resources in thought and word building enabled the handling of such new and alien themes. He drew attention to the laudable beginnings which *Carry* made in his "Universal Dictionary of the Oriental Languages derived from Sanskrit", and the "Proposed Version of Theological Terms" by *Rev. W. H. Mill* and his colleagues in the last century in *Calcutta*, which carried valuable notes on the proposed Sanskrit equivalents by the well-known Orientalist *H. H. Wilson*.

Fr. Thekkarakara, who presided, emphasised that Sanskrit could never be neglected, for it was not only necessary to understand, rightly and fully, Indian thought and culture, but also the discipline of mind that the mastery of such a perfect and beautiful classical language

gave made it an absolute necessity in the early stages of education.

The valedictory address was delivered by *K. Balasubramania Iyer, B.A., B.L.* advocate, on 9th Feb. '51. He criticised the method of teaching Sanskrit at present in vogue in schools as unsatisfactory.

Mr. N. Rangunatha Iyer, Asst. Editor 'THE HINDU', presiding over the meeting emphasised that we should guard ourselves against the danger of becoming denationalised and deracinated.

"I have a feeling", he said, "that much of the concern which is felt and which is audible to-day about Sanskrit is due to the fact that we are more actively thinking about such issues at present than we used to 20 years ago. We realise that the cultural heritage embodied in Sanskrit is so precious, that, if anything happens which might endanger it, we should fast lose our identity and our rightful place in the comity of cultural nations. This explains the sense of urgency and anxious concern that pervade all circles which attach importance to Sanskrit.

He said "that schools are but one element in the education of man; there should be simultaneous attempts to redeem the unredeemed animal in man on many planes and on many fronts. The family, the community and society should each play its part. He observed that revolutionary doctrines were being propounded and revolutionary remedies were being advocated for solving the ills of the Earth." It will be a good thing if we remind ourselves that there are

tried and tested methods for tackling the problems, though they are less spectacular. Our culture embodied in such works as Mahabharatha and Ramayana, has still a contemporary meaning. On every generation is cast the duty of fostering this culture, refining it and improving it and making it more valuable from the contemporary point of view.

Mr. Balasubramania Iyer said that the study of Sanskrit, the Mother of languages, would develop in the student accuracy of thought and exactness of expression. The popular notion that Sanskrit was difficult to learn was not

correct. This feeling had arisen mainly owing to the faulty method of teaching the language at present in vogue in schools. This method is of recent origin and should be given up. Sanskrit could be taught in a simpler way by teaching simpler words which were in common use in the various regional languages. They should be taught to study the Amara and should be taught the principles of Grammar in the simplified manner. With this he concluded his speech.

Science Association (Physics)

Our inaugural address was delivered towards the middle of the first term by Prof. Richard Filipowsky — the name sounds Polish — and there is certainly a lot of polish about this distinguished person. He is now Associate Professor of Electronics in the new-born M. I. T. and had been Chief-Engineer, Marconi Laboratories at Lisbon. His having done excellent work in Electronics, Television, and Impulse technique makes it difficult for one to name his speciality. I safely wriggle out of this situation by saying Prof. Filipowsky's greatest talent is in teaching. He spoke to us on "Radiation Detection with Geiger counters", an abstruse subject by itself but made simple by lucid exposition. Prof. Filipowsky is not a master of the language, but he did not falter once, and his pronunciation was clear. It is not his fault if most of us remember the analogies while clean forgetting the equations. The average mind is an unmathematical one, and it is as well, for a Tower of Babel would be preferable to a mathematical discourse before an audience that feels no glow on seeing a cosine term in a simple harmonic equation. The lecture was, as the old-time South Indian pedagogue would say, "an eminently edifying treatment of a subject of unparalleled importance in the vast field of mathematical physics, not to speak of the equally expansive and rapidly growing ground of radiation ...". Father Thekkaekara who presided fortunately restricted himself to a briefer remark!

The second term was signalised by the Silver Jubilee Celebrations and any sloth on my part can be deftly explained by a statement that was current and acceptable during those hectic days: I was working in 'connection' with the Exhibition. There were no meetings, but there was a physics Exhibition. The members of this Association were largely instrumental in bringing the business to a successful conclusion. It is said that some thousands of people came to look round our stalls. To one on the wrong side of the table, it seemed as if the entire population had gathered in Loyola College. Our explanations to the visitors drew pointed any very complimentary references from many sources. The last week of October, 1950 will be a memorable one for all of us.

We are indebted to Father Lourdu Yeddanapalli for both our meetings in the third term. He first got Dr. Gregor Wentzel of the Institute of Physics, Chicago, to speak to us on "Elementary Particles, Their Nature, and Interaction." Father Rector presided. It was a learned address.

Our last and in a sense, the best meeting was when Prof. A. D. Ross of Australia talked to us about Time and Space. The lecturer said only twelve people knew what Relativity meant, and he was not one of them. It struck me that the speaker knew about it too, but being a pious man, could not tolerate the idea of becoming the thirteenth... so much did he impress. His analogies

were remarkable, his humour just eluding the stone-headed, and his ideas clear-cut. He made us all understand that we don't understand anything, and that is an achievement in science. A failed candidate still knows more about the subject than one who did not write the examination at all. It is the same way with these scientific subjects. You might not be more articulate about them than a history student. Yet, yours is not ignorance. It is just your

inability to know, a very different matter.

Before I conclude, I must not fail to thank my colleague Mr. Ephraim. He was most helpful when we had fears of an empty hall. There is a notable free masonry between hostelers who speak the same language and Ephraim utilised it to advantage. He said the word, and the hall was full.

We have selected three slum areas for our social work and some of the highlights of our activities consist in periodical visits to slums, distribution of clothes and medicines among the slum dwellers, distribution of seeds to enable them to grow more food, eradication of illiteracy and educating the poor to learn the three R's, arranging free exhibition of film shows of educative value, and arbitrating occasionally in the local disputes. Every Sunday our members visit the slum areas and personally participate in the slum clearing campaign organised by the Corporation of Madras and teach the slum people to be sanitary-minded. The inauguration of Adult education department is another milestone in our social activities this year and it is worthy of mention that within a short period, our members have taught most of the illiterate slum dwellers how to read and write. We are also running a night school where our members teach twenty five slum children; issuing slates, books etc., free to them. As this system has shown encouraging results the League proposes to extend it to the slums also in

the next academic year. On the eve of festivals like Deepavali our members distribute oil, soapnut powder etc., among the slum people in order that they may observe their festivities with due happiness. Also with the kind help of The United States Information Service a number of free cinema shows was exhibited in the slum areas.

To enable our members to have a first hand knowledge of genuine social work done elsewhere, we took them on a visit to well-known institutions like the Little Sisters of the Poor, Y.M.C.A. Boys' Town and the Deaf and Dumb School.

The strength of members of our League is increasing and many students manifest a keen desire to associate themselves with the League activities. We also sent one of the Secretaries as our delegate to the Madras State Social Service League Conference at Madura.

In conclusion we express our fervent prayer to God Almighty in whose name we are offering our unstinted service to the poor, that He may continue to inspire us with the noble ideal of service to the poor.

Catholic Students' Union

It was with grief we learnt, on the 28th of June, of the sudden demise of Rev. Fr. P. Carty, S. J., the Father of the All India Catholic University Federation, the Pax Romana Movement in India, and of the "King's Rally". With a view to organize the Catholic intelligensia of India, he succeeded in instituting a C.S.U. in every Catholic College and a Newman Association Branch in every important town all knit together under the AICUF. May his soul rest in peace! The void thus created has been ably filled by Rev. Fr. Leguen, S.J.

On the 9th of July, the Catholic students assembled for an extraordinary meeting, presided over by Mr. Charles Sequeira, the Ex-Vice-President of the C.S.U. In the course of the meeting, Rev. Fr. Gordon, S. J., Rector, made clear the purpose of the C.S.U. and also laid stress on the working of the study clubs. He also suggested that the C.S.U. should organize an annual academy and hold competition in elocution and essay-writing. Office bearers were then elected. Mr. Edward Pinto, IV B.Com. (Hons.) as Vice-President and Messrs. Gerald Mathias IV B. Com. (Hons) and Eddie Frank, IV B. Com. as secretaries. After the election, a condolence resolution was passed to express our grief at the demise of Rev. Fr. P. Carty, S. J., Director of the AICUF.

As in previous years, it was agreed to have three study clubs. Rev. Fr. Pujjo, S.J., with Mr. Al. Ferris, II U.C., as secretary, took the intermediate sec-

tion. Rev. Fr. Gordon, S.J., with Mr. K. M. Ignatius, IV B.Sc. as Secretary and Fr. Thekkekara, with Mr. Salus Fernandes V B.Sc. (Hons), as secretary divided among themselves the Degree Course students.

The Inaugural meeting was held on the 16th of July with Mr. Edward Pinto, Vice-President in the chair. Mr. M. Ruthnaswamy, M.A. (Cantab), Bar-at-law, K. S. G. former Vice-Chancellor, Annamalai University, in his inaugural address presented a concrete idea of the role of Catholic Students in Free India.

Towards the close of the first term, a debate presided over by Mr. T. Mathew, M.A. was held which gave rise to a lively discussion. The subject was "That the solution to the world's ills lies in the substitution of private property under the captalistic system by collective ownership". Mr. M. Mathias, V B.A. (Hons) and Mr. T. K. Mathai IV B.A. (Hons) spoke for the proposition while Mr. Joy Joseph, V B. Sc. (Hons) and and Mr. K. M. Ignatius, IV B.Sc. opposed it. The vote of the house was not in favour of the proposition for the members were of the opinion that capitalism with its evils eradicated was preferable to Socialism. The Chairman, in his concluding remarks, observed that a combination of capitalism and socialism would be the best solution to the world's ills.

With the cooperation of the various colleges and schools in the city, we held on Sunday the 5th of November, an Academy in honour of the definition of

the Dogma of the Assumption of Our Lady. A representative gathering of the clergy and laity of the different parishes crowded to capacity the auditorium to pay their homage to Our Lady.

A Regional Conference, of the Catholic University students of Madras was held on the 19th of November, in the Bertram Hall with Mr. Dorai Raj in the chair. The subject for discussion was "The Catholic Intellectual and the work of Redemption". Mr. Kuriakose, Loyola College, spoke on "Catholic Intellectuals and Modern Science" and briefly brought out the relationship between Science and Religion. Miss Monica Sen, Presidency College, speaking on "Catholic Intellectuals and Political Order", pointed out the need for Catholics to evince keen interest in politics and also elucidated the relationship between the Church and State. The president then dealt with "Catholic Intellectuals and their professions". He explained at length the constant application of moral principles in the profession of Law, Medicine and Teaching. Rev. Fr. Gordon, Rector, in his concluding speech, emphasized the theological and philosophical backgrounds of the subject. The Secretary proposed a hearty vote of thanks.

At the beginning of the third term an essay competition under the auspices of the C.S.U. was held which evoked keen enthusiasm. The following are the winners.

Sodality of our Lady

Soon after the reopening of the College, both the old members and the freshmen who gave their names gathered in the College Church to elect the new Office bearers. Salus Fernandez, V.B.Sc. Hons. was elected as prefect,

K. M. Ignatius, IV. B. Sc., as Assistant and T. L. Varghese, IV Hons., as Secretary.

Then the Director explained the meaning and aims of the Sodality. Its chief purpose was the fostering of a tender

devotion towards Mary, so as, through her, to improve our Christian spirit. As for exterior activities, the Sodality, in this college, is less concerned with undertaking them herself, than with encouraging her members to join in activities carried out by the other existing organisation, the C.S.U.

From this, it should not be inferred that the Sodality as such was inactive. The Sodalists inaugurated this year the work of charity of visiting the sick in hospital. For several Sundays a batch of them took the bus, and went to spend an hour or so speaking with patients and distributing reading matter to them. A collection, amounting to Rs. 15, was made among the Sodalists to enable us to give small financial assistance to very poor patients.

The Missions Section, started in the previous year, and headed by Antoni Leo, has to its credit, this year, a Mission Sunday Academy which was much appreciated. Big posters gave the State of the Church in Protestant and Mission Countries, as well as the number of the victims of persecution in Communist countries. One essay described the hopes of the Church in Japan, and

another the sorrows of the Church in Communist China. A playlet, composed by Salus Fernandez, exemplified in a light and telling manner, how every Catholic, even the humblest, may take his share in the work of the Church.

The Mass-serving Section functioned this year very smoothly under the vigilant direction of T. Roshier.

Catholic Literature was sold on a very modest scale. About Rs. 30 were realised.

This year also, on the anniversary of the death of our four dear Sodalists, we visited and prayed at their tombs.

We took part in the Grand Rally of all the Sodalities of the town organized on the occasion of the definition of the Dogma of the Assumption, as well as in the celebrations held in Mylapore on the World Sodality Day.

Our Sodality Feast was held on 17—2—1951, when 9 candidates were solemnly received into the Sodality.

Our ordinary Sodality meetings were attended this year with hitherto unequalled fidelity.

The N. C. C.

There were 60 men on the rolls of the Coy., when the college reopened in June 1950. The vacancies were filled with lightening speed and the training started as early as July 4. Sgt. S. Rajakrishnan and Cpl. T. Sivagnanam, two of our U.O.T.C. cadets were valuable additions to the Coy.

At the end of the last academic year our old C.O. Major Anand Joshi was transferred to his Unit and his place was taken by Major R. S. Randhawa from the Rajputs. Lieut. K. Rajagopalan left the college to take up an appointment in the I.P.S. He finished his

training in Mount Abu and is now Asst. Superintendent of Police at Ganjam.

Last summer Capt. T. Murugaiyan did a six weeks' course of training at Fort St. George with the 2nd Travancore Infantry. The Cadets were trained in two categories, certificate men and recruits. Variety was introduced in training this year, in the form of outdoor exercises and sand model TEWTS in addition to the usual parade square training in the college.

There were two Camps this year. One was a Cadre camp held at Pallavaram in September. Two officers and forty men from this Coy. attended the camp. The training was good. During the celebration of parents day we staged a Guard-mounting display which was much appreciated.

The Annual Camp was held at Arkonam from 19th December 1950 to 2nd January 1951. Out of an active strength of 140, 130 men attended the camp. Even the other would have attended the camp had it not been held during Christmas. A special feature of this camp was the visits by Ministers. The regimental sports conducted on New Year's day was presided over by the Hon'ble. Chief Minister Mr. P. S. Kumaraswami Raja. The camp dispersed on 2nd January 1951.

Competitions were conducted this year on an unprecedented scale. In addition to our usual Inter-platoon competition for Rev. Fr. Murphy Shield, we had extensive competition on Coy. and battalion basis. In the Inter-Coy.

competitions we won in foot-ball and Tug-of-war and narrowly missed winning Cricket, Hockey, Volleyball and drill. We were runners up. In the shooting competition Cdt. Amarjit Singh came first in the battalion. On the 13th and 14th January 1951, the Inter-Unit Sports Rally was conducted by No. 2 circle N.C.C. Our battalion won the championship. In the Inter-Platoon competition 11 Platoon commanded by C.S.M. Chunilal won the Rev. Fr. Murphy Shield.

Coy. sports were conducted by us for the first time this year. Some of the interesting events were the 400 metres FSMO race, Crawling Relay and fireman's lift relay. Cpl. Ferris with gigantic strides proved too good. The crawling relay in which 4 men of every team had to crawl on their stomach for 10 yards was most trying.

We had a large number of ceremonial parades this year. We took part in the guard of honour to H.E. the Governor at the Convocation of the University, to the Chief Minister during the Silver Jubilee of our college and then again to H.E. the Governor on our College Day. We took part in a ceremonial march past on the Republic Day. The commander was Capt. M. G. Nilakantan. The N. C. C. was cheered all along its way to the saluting base. For the first Republic day celebrations at New Delhi, the N. C. C. sent a contingent on an all India basis. Our battalion sent 20 men from Madras, of whom five were ours. The Madras N. C. C. put up the best show.

Certificate examinations were conducted twice this year. In October 1950, we presented twelve candidates for the 'B' certificate. All passed creditably and U/O R. G. Micetich and U O T. K. Panchapakesan obtained distinction and passed first and second in the Battalion. The second examination was held in February 1951. We sent eighteen men for 'B' certificate and two men for 'C' certificate. The results are awaited.

Two of our cadets Cpl. Ravindran and Cadet Ravindranath were selected for the Joint Service Wing of the National Defence Academy this year.

I must place on record our thanks to our circle Commander Lt. Col. D. Basappa. Our C. O. Major R. S. Randhawa is a diplomat and leader. An officer with such qualities is indispensable to the N. C. C. at this juncture. Sub-Alagiriswamy, Jem. Ramakrishna Pillai, C. H. M. Doraisawamy and C. H. M. Thomas deserve our praise for the unstinted co-operation they gave us in training and other directions. The H. Q. Staff, particularly Messrs Royan and Thomas were as usual very helpful.

Tennis

In the Inter Collegiate League, which this year was conducted on a zonal basis, the college was represented by C. G. Somiah and I. Balasundaram, in singles as well as in doubles. We had to play six other colleges drawn in our zone and the only match that we last was against Vivekananda College, in spite of which, we topped the list on our zone and qualified for the inter-zonal contest, where we lost to Law College, the eventual winners of the League.

The Stanley and Erskine cup tournaments were held in August and there was a record number of entries both for singles and doubles. A feature of the match was the meteoric rise to fame of R. In the Inter-Collegiate knock-out tournament I. Balasundaram lost to Pantulu in the quarter finals not before extending him fully. C. G.
