Here is an exclusive interview with Mr. B V Amala Rajendhran, one of the senior non teaching staff members of Loyola College, who has been working in Loyola since 1990. He began his career as a Non Teaching staff in Commerce Department (from 1990 to 1996). From then onwards, he has been working in Loyola Institute of Vocational Education (LIVE). He shares us about yesteryear's biorhythm of Loyola; the history of LIVE -- its evolution; and his 21 plus years of retrospection in the continuum.

What do you like most in Loyola College?

The atmosphere, the ambience, the surroundings and the way people behave.

How does your family respond to your work in campus?

Since the day I joined Loyola, my family holds a trust on this institution. When I was working for the Department of Commerce, I used to stay back until 8.30pm almost every day. My wife and children are happy that I am safely employed in a well protected environment.





Do you know

Loyola won the Wilson cup for the first time 1951. Hockey goalie, Muneer Sait, a Loyolite played for all India team against Belgians in 1961-62. Another Star hockey player Sultan M. Shah was selected as a member of the national hockey team. (1973-74). In the same year Madhavan from Loyola played under - 19 national Cricket team against Pakistan. Captain of the tennis-team, Ashok Amirtharaj became a National Junior Champion. In tennis, Vasudevan won the Junior National Champion. For the first time when Asiad was held in India in the year 1982, Vasudevan reached semi-finals in the tennis and Ram Gopal Narayan won the bronze medal as a member of the Indian water-polo team. D. Marimuthu won the ball badminton nationals at Delhi and was given the `Star of India' Award (1984-85). Keith Cooper and Ravikumar were selected to attend the Indian Junior Camp and Cooper was a member of the India Junior team (Tennis) which toured USSR and Pakistan. Viswanathan Anand has become a legend in Chess and he passed out from Loyola in the late nineties.

Loyola College has been conducting 'EXODUS CAMP', a preparatory coaching program for the under privileged students particularly poor catholic students from the villages, the Dalits, Orphans and Semi-orphans by providing them with language skills, Life skills, city exposure and so on in order to take up degree studies in Loyola College and other colleges effectively. EXODUS CAMP was conducted from 24th April to 18th May 2016 and 442 students from different districts of Tamil Nadu benefitted from it. This year 'EXODUS CAMP – 2016' was further strengthened and enhanced in collaboration with ONGC. The fine gesture of ONGC which sponsored for 100 students enabled Loyola College Management to reach out to the periphery and provide the opportunity for the socially deprived sections and first generation learners from the villages.

Activities

The activities of the camp include English Language classes, Motivational sessions, Spiritual activities, Guest lectures on various social issues, Cultural events, Sports competitions etc. Thus we have tried our best to provide a holistic formation to the under privileged students and prepare them to face their college studies with ease and future challenges.



Outcome

- Acquired Basic English knowledge and gained confidence to speak in English by getting rid of their fear and inhibition.
- Took part in spiritual and cultural events



DESAM camp was conducted from 3rd May till 13th May 2016. It is conducted every year for the Gypsy children from the neighborhood of Chennai to help them to improve their health, sanitation, skills and educational status. Nearly 75 Gypsy children (from Pallavaram, Guindy, Minjur and Kotturpuram settlements) have benefitted. We tried our best to promote them to the next stage in education and alleviate drop outs in their community. Being a residential camp, the children were taught through play way methods. Thus they were groomed in discipline, relationship, table etiquette, general knowledge and social awareness. Eminent personalities, social activists and artists were invited to share their experiences and motivate them in social awareness and social justice. This exposure to a new culture and atmosphere broadened their outlook and instilled in them the desire to come up in life in spite of great difficulties and huge hurdles.

FOLLOW UP

- Starting Tuition centers in Gypsy Colonies with the help of DESAM Volunteers to reduce drop outs.
- Admitting Eight Gypsy students in Loyola School, Kuppayanallur who will slowly become ambassadors of higher education for gypsy communities.
- Updating data of the Gypsy people to motivate them to address their also needs and rights from the government.

LSSS-Workshop on Theater for Transformation

Every year Art and Literary section of LSSS conducts Theater for Transformation workshop for our LSSS volunteers. This year it was held on from 7th May 2016 till 10th May 2016 at Asissy Illam, Sembarambakkam. Nearly 35 students participated in the training. During this training all the folk forms and theater techniques were given by special resource person's invited from different places in Tamil Nadu.

The aim of the workshop is to review the traditional folk forms and also remember the suppressed cultural nuances. Our resource person concentrated on the skill of every student. The objective is to develop each student's life style through subaltern culture.



Every day program started with small theater exercise along with social awareness songs and theater techniques.

Before the final day, our team members conduct one special performance in the field. This field experience sustained their creative idea and also learned the importance of social responsibility.

This summer camp fine-tuned behavior of the students transferred their opinion and thoughts through the alternate media skills. The students learned the difference between their class room skills and on the ground communication skill. This effective workshop designed and organized by Loyola Students Support Services, under the valuable guidance of Rev. Dr. M S Jacob SJ, Director and Dr. Kaleeswaran, the Coordinator for Art & literary section.

Special English Coaching Classes (SECC)

LSSS is conducting Special English Coaching Classes for all the Tamil medium students of I year UG. The classes have begun from 17th August 2016 and it will continue till 17th March 2016. This year tutors are hired from the trained institution like MAGNUM OPUS centers. And also LSSS is grateful to Mrs. Kannagi Pakckianathan I.A.S. for her voluntary service to our students. The experts trained the students especially in verbal communication and descriptive writing. Nearly 350 students from shift I and shift II is are making use of this service.



College reopened for II, III U.G. & II P.G. on 16th June 2016. The nominations for LSU was announced immediately and the election was conducted on 18th June. Almost 5000 students of Loyola College came together recently to elect the students council. The students Union plays an integral part in every major event of the college, and it has been a platform for many young social workers, politicians and leaders. The Students Union successfully conducts a camp for Dalit Students annually, and supports many deserving students with academic and financial aid.

The Loyola Campus is WiFi enabled and therefore elections are conducted electronically across 97 polling stations within the campus.

This exercise in democracy and student solidarity is ensured by the College Election Commission, which prepares for several contingencies like erratic power supply, system and software issues, and malpractice.

Dr. K.S. Antonysamy, PRO and Election Commissioner said that hassle-free electronic polling has been conducted for the last three years now. This also gives Student Representatives and their supporters the mechanism to monitor and oversee electronically the process.

The students complete all campaigning work a day ahead of the elections. After the declaration of the final list of nominees, the manifestos are presented by the representatives to the entire college.



On the Election Day, students voted amidst high security and under electronic vigilance to avoid any kind of malpractice or the influence of money or politics inside the campus.

The student community elected Sunil Kumar (14-EL-068) as the President; Jayavardhanan (14-EC - 207) as the Vice President; Dixon Sebas (14-VC-117) as the Secretary; Ithikhas Natrajan (14-VC-047) as the Joint Secretary and Monica (15-PVC-03) as the Associate Secretary.

With the support of all officials of the college, Rev. Dr. Arockiasamy Xavier, Principal, Loyola college ensured the election process to be flawless and also introduced the elected members to the student community.

Based on the deliberations and insights received from participants the Loyola College (Autonomous) Chennai-34, would like to present the report to MHRD and the committee responsible for drafting NEP to consider the observations and suggestions appropriately for drafting the final National Education Policy 2016.

The crux of the insight obtained through deliberation is that the new draft of education policy must reflect the pedagogy that is learner centred. The new draft of education policy must reflect human excellence, which is with a focus on ideals of forming men and women for and with others. The new draft of education policy must reflect Democratic principles of the Nation to uphold unity in diversion and a new draft of education policy

must be framed with the help of educationists, legalists and experts from all fields. The new draft of education policy must reflect country's diversity, secular and socialistic character, brotherhood, social justice, respect state's individuality, decentralization of power, autonomy to institutions and other constitutional guarantees. The locus standi of minorities' educational service must be ensured under the constitution article 30 (1). The new education policy must take cognisance of various judgements of the Supreme Court, that have upheld the above constitutional guarantee.

Prestigious Honour to Dr. S. Vincent, Dean of Research

The Royal Society of Biology, London has elected Dr. S. Vincent, Dean of Research, Loyola College as a fellow of Royal society of Biology by its resolution on July 01, 2016 for his outstanding contribution to biological sciences. It is very rare honour for an Indian biologist to have such a distinguished fellowship.

This honour has been conferred on him following his commendable contributions in the field of aquatic biology especially the heavy metal toxicity affecting the quality and sustenance of aquatic biosystem using fish as bioindicator. In addition, for the first time in the country, he designed and implemented GIS strategy for the management of storm water drain in relevance to public health issues in urban cities to combat vector borne diseases. The study forms the reference work for the Corporation of Chennai in planning urban development through mapping the stagnant and water currents and disease epidemic hotspots.

He has also contributed an “Integrated online prediction system for disaster and disease outbreaks in controlling diseases and managing disasters” which is popular in Indian as well as International contexts. The technology has been transferred to King Institute of Preventive Medicine and Research, Govt. of Tamilnadu for managing the vector borne disease outbreaks in the state. In addition, he has developed several ecofriendly bioinsecticide formulations against various species of mosquito vectors causing the spread of potent viral and parasitic diseases and the publications on these formulations have been well cited in peer reviewed journals.

He has published numerous papers in peer reviewed journals with good number of citations in India and international. It is much evident of his research contribution with the credential of (H)-index 19 as indicator with cumulative impact factor of 74 and total citations of 789.

In brief, his significant contribution interlinks the bioresearch areas such as assessing



aquatic toxicity using appropriate bioindicators and biomarkers, vector control by bioinsecticides and management of diseases and disasters by Geographical Information Systems (GIS). Besides having several peer reviewed publications and citations of his work in India and abroad, he filed five patents that have industrial utility and completed several projects with noteworthy research outcomes.

As a Task Force Member, he has made a technical report on “GAJAH- Securing the Future of Elephants in India” under “Elephant Task Force”, Ministry of Environment & Forest and Climate Change, GoI to arrive effective strategies for elephant protection in India after visiting numerous elephant habitats and corridors throughout India. He also substantially contributed towards science popularization through consistent delivery of talks in e-media, popular lectures at academic institutions and written articles in leading newspapers and magazines. His concepts secured several projects from government agencies such as DST, DBT, DIT, Ministry of Earth Sciences and DAE.




