He has proficiency in various languages like German, English, Spanish, Portuguese, French and Italian. His works are specialized and remain classical in the field of Latin American Studies.

Dr. Jurgen Buchenau, Chair of the Department of History, University of North Carolina Charlotte, Charlotte, NC, USA focuses much on Latin American Studies. He completed his graduation from Universitat zu Köln, Germany and Ph.D from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1993. Works of his credit are, 'Mexico's Once and Future revolution: social upheaval and the challenge of rule', 'The last Caudillo: Alvaro Obregon and the Mexican revolution', 'Mexican mosaic: A Brief History of Mexico', 'Tools of progress: A German merchant clan in Mexico city, 1865 to present'. Dr. Jurgen has been honoured with Fulbright Hays Group Project Abroad award from the U.S Department of Education, Quadrille Ball Award for research methodology,

and he is the Board Advisor of Carolinas Clean Air Coalition and a Board member in clubs like American Historical Association, Envirotech, North American Conference on British Studies and Society for History Studies. His contributions towards Environmental History are remarkable in terms of both numbers and the quality of research he had undertaken.

Dr. Peter Thorsheim, Director of Graduate Studies, Department of History, University of North Carolina Charlotte, Charlotte NC, USA. He completed his graduation from Carleton College in 1991 and conferred his doctorate from University of Wisconsin – Madison, 2000. He continues to contribute towards the discipline by producing many books that holds the chance for inter disciplinary researches.

David Johnson, Associate Professor, Department of History, University of North Carolina Charlotte, Charlotte NC, USA is known for his works New Delhi: The last Imperial City and Death and the End of Empire in India. The latter work examines the parallel process by which Britain released its cemeteries and memorials in India and the manner in which India claimed and reinterpreted these sites of Imperial memory, Imperial mourning and Imperial power. His writings are in search of the remains of Imperial powers especially the material remains left behind.
