



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PREFACE



In her arms, the hostel nurtured luminaries who now adorn prominent positions across the globe. The hostel is more than just a collection of buildings; it is a place that fosters filial bonding, where happy memories are cherished. Its influence on the development of character in early life is enduring. Staying at Loyola Hostel (LOHO - 100) is an exciting and an enlightening experience.



It is an energizing opportunity to meet students from different parts of the country, to establish fruitful relationships, to enjoy varied socio-cultural events and to create a meaningful impact on their lives.

Loyola Hostel (LOHO 100) is an entity of Loyola College Society that provides accommodation to boys of UG, PG, and Ph.D. programmes. It is administered by the Society of Jesus. The hostel is governed by the Director along with his team of Assistant Directors.



Our Vision

LOHO 100 pursues the Ignatian hallmarks to perceive God in everyone and be compassionate. It aims to promote holistic formation and learning in order to become responsible persons in society.

Multi-Cuisine Mess Halls

A variety of appetising and hygienic food is served for hostellers and guests at three different mess halls: vegetarian, non-vegetarian & Metro. Also, mineral water plants are available in different places within the campus to provide both hot and cold drinking water.





Counselling / Career Guidance

At LOHO 100, the psychological well-being of the students is profoundly cared for to facilitate a hassle-free learning environment and hence creates a strong mind to carry out academic tasks successfully with proper

guidance and counselling services. Career-guided talks are also given to the students in order to strengthen their aspirations and help them choose a better career and programme.

Internet Facilities

The Wi-Fi campus provides free internet access to students 24x7 with high speed for instant references, resources, and research, enhancing their digital learning experience and fostering a tech-driven academic environment.



Scholarships

Deserving students who are socially disadvantaged and physically challenged receive financial support and scholarships to pursue their studies comfortably.

Remedial Programmes

Remedial classes are arranged for students 'who strive for excellence.' They are guided and supported academically by the senior students and Assistant Directors.



Health and Physical Wellbeing

Free medicines and medical services are provided to sick students. Managing a well-equipped gym, indoor and outdoor games facilities are available to cater to the physical fitness of all hostellers.

Reading Room

An exclusive reading room is open to students to update themselves with daily news and interesting information from dailies, books, and magazines. Furthermore, common reading halls are available for the students to have study discussions.





Guest Room

Guest rooms are available for the parents and the guests of the inmates. Students can book the guest rooms in advance by obtaining permission from the Director.

LOHO Shop

A shop is honed within the hostel premises to meet all sorts of stationery and personal requirements of the inmates.



Laundry and Tailoring



There is a salon within the LOHO 100 premises. Besides, the hostellers can make use of laundry facilities which are open from 9:00 am to 4:00 pm

every day. Also, tailoring is available on the premises to stitch new clothes or mend the old.

Blanket Distribution

Loyola Hostel provides ample opportunities for all the students to get equipped in various fields. One such opportunity is to reach the unreached. Every year, before Christmas, our hostel boys use to go out in the city, search for the poor platform dwellers, the destitute, and the unreached people to provide them with blankets and protect them from the shivering winter.

The students, accompanied by the Assistant Directors go out for the distribution at night while the people are on the roads sleeping, and keep the blanket next to them without their notice and leave the place. This sharing of joy brings hope in those people and make them feel that there are human beings with generous hearts around them.

LOHO from 1925 - 2025

A Century of Tradition and Growth

Foundation and Early Development (1925–1938)



oyola College, established in 1925, aimed to provide students with a structured and conducive living environment through its hostel system. The initial hostel blocks, Aelen and Willingdon, were built with 30 single rooms each, providing individual accommodations while fostering a community-driven

atmosphere. The design ensured adequate space, privacy, and a comfortable setting for academics while also promoting social interactions.

Accessibility was initially a challenge before a road was built connecting Sterling Road to the college site. The design of the hostels allowed flexibility, with small rooms convertible into larger spaces by removing partitions. Water supply was a significant concern, and to address it, a deep well was dug to provide a reliable source of clean water. The hostels also included bathing areas and mess halls to cater to student needs.

By 1926, an additional block, the Balcony Hostel, was constructed, featuring a unique architectural style with small recesses that could be converted into balconies. This design improved ventilation and allowed more natural light into the rooms. As student numbers increased, the college added six new blocks between 1927 and 1930, designed with two floors and 26 rooms per floor. These blocks were built with pre-cast concrete verandahs to reduce costs and construction time, marking a significant advancement in infrastructure development.



Hostel administration followed a decentralized model, where students managed their own mess sections. By 1928, the number of hostel residents had exceeded 300, necessitating further expansion and improved facilities, including additional mess halls, recreation areas, and expanded water supply systems. Sporting activities such as football, hockey, and cricket were introduced, with dedicated fields to promote physical wellbeing.

Infrastructure Expansion and Student Life (1939–1978)

Between 1939 and 1978, the college expanded its hostel infrastructure significantly, adding multiple new blocks, including six additional student hostels, bringing the total capacity to over 500 students. Additional blocks were constructed with improved ventilation, better sanitation facilities, and a more optimized space design to enhance the students' living experience.

By 1936, the hostel reached full capacity, housing 400 students, all in single rooms. Efforts were made to ensure comfort by upgrading dormitory designs, improving sanitation systems, and establishing a structured governance system to oversee hostel operations.



Catholics Hostel Loyola College, Nungambakkam

The hostel community was diverse, comprising students from various regions and cultural backgrounds. This diversity fostered an environment of learning beyond academics. Hostel life was vibrant, with societies and clubs formed based on interests such as fashion, academia, and sports. Cricket became a widely followed sport, and students actively participated in tournaments. Literary and debate clubs flourished,

encouraging intellectual discussions and the sharing of ideas.

The hostel mess system evolved to cater to dietary preferences, maintaining up to 12 different mess sections. Each section was student-managed, promoting responsibility and self-governance. The mess halls expanded, accommodating the growing student population, and food quality improved with modernized kitchen facilities.

Challenges during this period included water shortages and health crises. A cholera outbreak in 1933 led to strict sanitation measures, including deepening the hostel well and improving the water supply system. Additional bore wells were dug to supplement the water supply, and hygiene standards were reinforced through regular inspections.



Modernization and Autonomy (1978–2000)

With Loyola College gaining autonomous status in 1978, hostel infrastructure saw significant modernization, including the installation of advanced sanitation systems, improved ventilation, enhanced recreational spaces, and upgraded mess facilities to cater to a growing and diverse student population.



Technological advancements were introduced, including Wi-Fi connectivity, a centralized communication system, and digital record-keeping for hostel management. Mess facilities were further upgraded to accommodate various student preferences, and dedicated health centers were established for medical emergencies. A fully equipped medical bay was introduced to provide round-the-clock healthcare services.

The Loyola Hostel Young Men's Union played a vital role in organizing guest lectures, debates, and cultural programs. One of the most notable events was a lecture by Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel in 1929, which inspired students to engage in national discourse.



Financial support schemes were improved to ensure hostel accessibility for economically disadvantaged students. Scholarships and subsidies were During the 1990s, additional recreational spaces were introduced, including sports fields, common rooms, and study areas. A library extension was established within the hostel premises to encourage academic excellence among residents. Security measures were also enhanced, ensuring the safety of students.



introduced, making quality hostel accommodation more inclusive. Funding support from alumni networks enabled further development projects, including the addition of computer labs and multimedia centers.

Recent Developments and Present-Day Facilities (2000–2023)

As of 2023, Loyola College hosts approximately 1,500 students across 19 hostel blocks for male students and a dedicated four-storey building for female students, as per the latest official records. The hostels are equipped with modern amenities, including high-speed Wi-Fi, reading rooms, multiple mess halls, and indoor recreational spaces.



The mess facilities now offer a diverse menu catering to various dietary needs, ensuring high-quality and nutritionally balanced meals. The kitchens have been modernized with automated cooking facilities to enhance efficiency and hygiene standards.

To sustain Loyola's hostel legacy, continuous renovations, digitalized hostel management, and enhanced security measures have been implemented. Surveillance systems and biometric entry were introduced to maintain safety standards. Solar energy initiatives have been integrated into hostel facilities to promote sustainability. Additionally, green initiatives such as rainwater harvesting and waste management systems have been implemented to reduce the environmental footprint.

A dedicated grievance redressal system has been established to address student concerns effectively. A counseling center within the hostel premises provides mental health support, academic guidance, and career counseling to ensure the holistic well-being of students.

The hostel system remains a cornerstone of Loyola College, embodying a century of academic excellence, cultural diversity, and holistic student development. With a strong legacy and continuous advancements, the Loyola College Hostel system is poised to serve future generations with the same commitment to excellence that has defined it for nearly a century.



A New Development Era for the Students' Welfare (2023- 2025)

Loyola Hostel then experienced a period of substantial development, prioritizing student welfare and infrastructure enhancements. Paver block pathways are laid everywhere inside the hostel, improving accessibility. The Arrupe Wellness room provides a dedicated space for sick students. In February, a foundation stone was laid for co-worker housing and it is ready to be inaugurated, acknowledging their crucial role. Infrastructure upgrades encompassed common block, toilet, and kitchen renovations, alongside the installation of an LED display in front of Sauliere Hall. The renovated Andrew Administrative Block and messes were blessed in September 2023, followed by the installation and blessing of a new generator in November 2024, ensuring power continuity. Commemorating its centennial, the Sauliere Centennial Park was inaugurated in January 2025, celebrating the hostel's rich history and future.

graduation in Tata Institute of Social Sciences, Bombay, I received a mail from the newly-appointed Rector Fr. Casmir Raj that I have been appointed as the director of the hostel for the next academic year onwards. My immediate reaction was that I would not be able to take up this responsibility as I had little knowledge about hostel administration. I wrote a letter to him declining the appointment. He replied to me saying that it was the decision after a through consultation. I had no choice but to accept it. I expressed my hesitation and fears to one of former director Fr. M. A. James, who held the post three

years earlier. Based on his experiences, he encouraged me to take up the work and offered valuable tips on the administration of LOHO. Among many things, one of the important wisdom he shared that struck to my memory to this day was this. He said, "Remember that you are not going to do this work. If you are open to God's promptings, God will be by your side, guiding you". With reluctance I accepted the responsibility in the year 1980.

In those days, there was a habit among the students to fire crackers in the middle of the night to disturb the silence. A group of students would keep a loud firecracker in the toilet, with a lit cigarette at one end of the wig. So, by the time the firecracker went off, students would have safely dispersed to their rooms and there would be no way to identify them. They would enjoy the fun.



advised not to come out of my room at those times as it would be useless to look for the culprit. Students were also taking stock of how the new Director is reacting to such incidents.

I was worried as the situation was becoming worse. I was asking God for some guidance of what I could do. One day, in the middle of the night, I was walking around the hostel, deep in thought regarding this issue. I have no idea or reason to enter a block. It was around 12 in the night. As I was walking along the corridor, a door was opening, and a student came with a handful of crackers. The time he came out and my reaching the place was almost the same. I stretched out my hand towards the student and to this day, I cannot understand why I did that. He was surprised to see me there and he had no option but to hand over the crackers. The news of this spread like wildfire among the students next morning. That put an end to this menace for the rest of the year.

I remembered what Fr. M. A. James told me when I was hesitating to take up the work. I realized that it was not me who was administrating the hostel. It is someone above who guided me, if only I was open to him and raised my heart to him. This is one of the memorable incidents of my life as the Director of the Loyola Hostel.

MY MEMORIES AS THE DIRECTOR OF LOHO

During my tenure as the Director of Loyola Hostel, I strongly believed that hostelers should feel at home. And that belief became the driving force behind many of the improvements we introduced at LOHO. I wanted the hostel to not only be a place where students resided but also a place where they could thrive, feeling both comfortable and cared for. One of the most pressing concerns I noticed was the increasing number of food delivery boys waiting at the hostel gate. It became clear that students were not with the food we provided. This motivated me to take immediate action.

I upgraded the quality of groceries from second to first quality to ensure that we served nutritious, delicious meals that students would enjoy. To enhance their dining experience, I renovated the dining hall, creating a welcoming ambiance where hostelers could sit and dine comfortably.

Recognizing the diverse tastes of our students, I also introduced a North Indian mess that served non-vegetarian food every day of the week. This addition was well received. and to further elevate the dining experience, we implemented a buffet system that offered unlimited meals. These changes were pivotal in transforming the students' experience at LOHO.





Beyond the dining experience, I took steps to improve the overall living conditions at the hostel. The garden received extra care, adding greenery and serenity to the hostel premises. We installed a large TV in Sauliere Hall, which became a hub for shared entertainment, and provided a separate TV for the North Indian hostelers to cater to their specific preferences.

The hostel's operational systems were also modernized. We computerized the accounts system and installed RO water plants to ensure that hostelers had access to clean, treated water.

With the growing demand for hostel admission, I increased the capacity by adding 500 new cots, bathrooms, and dining spaces, and we revamped the drainage system for better sanitation. A centralized kitchen was introduced to streamline food preparation and improve efficiency. Equally important was the welfare of the staff. I made it a priority to increase the salary scale of both the hostel administration and kitchen staff to ensure they were fairly compensated for their hard work. I also took the initiative to set up a new canteen, where the profit was equally shared among the staff. This helped provide additional financial support for their children's education.



Additionally, we strengthened the compound wall to enhance security. A new tar road was laid on the premises, improving accessibility and the overall look of the hostel grounds. We also installed a new gate towards the college church, enhancing both the aesthetics and security of the hostel. Several hostel blocks were upgraded to provide better living conditions for the students. Blocks 1, 2, and 13 were renovated with new tiles, giving the buildings a modern, and clean look.

All these efforts, slowly but surely, contributed to Loyola Hostel shining like a bright star. I often reminded my hostelers, "I make sure that you get good food, better accommodation, and games articles to play. In return, you must study well." This balance of care and responsibility became a cornerstone of the hostel's environment, fostering both academic and personal growth.

These memories and experiences, I believe, have played a significant role in shaping the remarkable legacy of LOHO. As we celebrate this monumental milestone, I am proud to have been a part of it.

As LOHO steps into its next century, my wishes for this beloved institution are filled with hope and optimism. I envision LOHO continuing to be a nurturing home for students, where they not only receive the finest education but also develop a strong moral compass, guided by the values of integrity, discipline, and inclusivity. May the hostel remain a place where friendships are forged, and where students of diverse backgrounds come together to learn from each other, and become responsible citizens of the world.

I aspire for LOHO to keep up with the changing times, embracing innovation while holding on to the traditions that make it such a special place. From modernizing facilities to enhancing student services, I hope LOHO continues to evolve in ways that meet the needs of future generations. LOHO – Home Away from Home was not merely a phrase but a lived reality, where the vibrant diversity of young minds was nurtured in an environment of holistic education.

Loyola Hostel was more than just accommodation-it was a true home for a majority of our hostellers, especially first-generation learners, students from socially and economically disadvantaged backgrounds, and those with single or no parents. It served as a transformative bridge, connecting students from the academic realm to comprehensive personal growth. In the words of St. Ignatius of Loyola, "Go forth and set the world on fire." Loyola Hostel instilled this Ignatian spirit, empowering students to become men and women for others.





My years at Loyola College and Hostel

My years at Loyola College and Hostel from 1957 to 1961 profoundly shaped my life. It transformed my personality, enhanced my career prospects, and broadened my vision.

The hostel housed students from diverse backgrounds, fostering a sense of global citizenship. The Students from several states of India, mainly from the southern states, in addition to students from Asian counties like Sri Lanka, Malaysia and also from East African countries stayed in the hostel. There were six messes. A and B were vegetarian, C was called Andhra Mess, D was called

Kerala Mess E was called European Mess and F mess was called ordinary non-veg Mess. Messes other than A and B were non-vegetarian, catering to the needs of various groups of students. As a steadfast vegetarian, I was with either A or B messes.

In MA. class, I was studying in my room at 2nd Floor, Catholic Block. One night, the Hostel Warden, Fr. Rapina, who was from Italy, was on rounds. He entered my room and saw me reading a book. He looked at the photo of Periyar E V Ramasamy hanging on the wall in my room. Though he could not recognize Periyar, I was afraid that he might punish me for my political affinity. He asked me who it was, and I replied that it was my grandfather. He smiled and went away. Our silence hour was from 8.30 p.m. when we had to remain in our rooms. Our Warden was strict, but at the same time, he was considerate to the needs of the students. One fine morning, when it was drizzling, the hostellers hesitated to go in the rain. The Warden asked the students not to go to the College. He met the Principal and persuaded him to declare a holiday. He appealed that, "If my students get drenched, they will get fever and I will be held responsible. So, it is better to declare a holiday." The Principal, Fr. Arulsamy, who was also very strict, yielded to the pressure of the warden and declared holiday on that day. All the day scholars who reached the college had to return to their homes in the rain, while we the hostellers remained safe in the hostel

While studying B.A Economics, I started participating in Tamil debates. Within a year, I was selected for the college Tamil Debating Team. My Tamil Professor, Mr. Arulanandam, constantly encouraged me to hone my oratorical skills. After I joined M.A. Economics, I began participating in English debates also. I represented the

Loyola College Tamil and English debating teams. My English Professor, Fr. Lawrence Sundaram, who later on became the Principal, encouraged me to further develop my English language skills. He advised me that it will be useful in my future endeavours. I will never forget his valuable advice, which shaped the course of my political and academic administration careers.

Political activities were not allowed inside the campus. However, some students sympathized with the then ruling party (Congress) or the main opposition (DMK). Elections for the messes were conducted, in which students from both sides used to contest. Mr. M.O.H. Farook Maricar (who later on became the Chief Minister of Pondicherry, and a Union Minister) led one side while I led the other.

Since political leaders could not be invited directly to the College, we used to invite them for intercollegiate functions. We invited the former Chief Minister, Mr. C. N. Annadurai (Anna) and the former Governor General, Mr. Rajaji. With the help of Prof. Arulanandham, we invited Paavender Bharathidasan, who was known as the Revolutionary Poet. Perhaps, this was the formal beginning of my political career.

We used to elect the College Union President every year by voting in the election meeting at Bertram Hall. Mr. V. Selvaraj (Retd. IAS) and I contested the election. In my address to the students, I spoke the first sentence in Tamil and then switched over to English. The Non-Tamil students considered me as a Tamil fanatic and voted against me. Therefore, I lost the election. Loyola College used to produce a number of IAS, IPS and IFS Officers every year. Inspired by this, I also wrote the Union Public Service Commission exam and got through in the first attempt itself. I was offered IPS, but since the posting was in Tripura, Manipur Union Territory Cadre, I did not join.

I was a disciplined student. I had cent percent attendance in all four years. In the four years that I was in Loyola, I never applied for leave. We had many Fathers from foreign countries. Our Head of the Department of English, Fr. Murphy, was from England, the Head of the Department of Economics, Fr. Basnec, was from Germany and the Hostel Warden Fr. Rapina was from Italy.

When I established Vellore Engineering College in 1984, which is now Vellore Institute of Technology (VIT), I had Loyola College as my model. I wanted to have the quality and discipline of Loyola, which we attained to a large extent. Today, VIT has evolved as an institution with 1,00,000 students in four campuses at Vellore, Chennai, Amaravati (Andhra Pradesh) and Bhopal (Madhya Pradesh).



Cherishing Countless Memories

Serving as a hostel warden in a Jesuit hostel was one of the most fulfilling experiences of my life, as it gave me the chance to balance two seemingly contradictory roles: maintaining discipline and being a friendly, approachable figure for the students. Jesuit education places great emphasis on values like cura personalis (care for the whole person), magis (the pursuit of excellence), and community, and my approach to being a warden reflected these ideals. While I firmly believed in upholding the rules of the hostel, I also

strived to be someone who was relatable, approachable, and willing to listen to the students. One of the first things I focused on was fostering a sense of community. LOHO, as a Home away from Home is not just a place for a stay but a paradise where a hosteller experiences a life in abundance. "The shepherd must kno "Shepherds must live with the smell of the sheep" says Pope Francis. I knew every student entrusted to my care personally.

As the Chief Cultural Coordinator, I had the privilege of organizing regular group activities such as inter-hostel cultural nights, Welcome Freshers, Christmas, group dyanamics sessions, sports tournaments and literary discussions on various themes, SYS (Sing your Soul), "Nilachoru (Moonlight Dinner)". These activities helped students bond with each other and build friendships that extended beyond the hostel. From the very beginning of the academic year, I knew that the arrival of freshers was a crucial moment to shape their experience at the hostel. Many of them were understandably nervous, unsure of what to expect, and often struggled with the loneliness that comes with adapting to a new environment. Recognizing this, I designed two programmes namely "Vaanga Pazhagalam" & "Moodar Koodam" that aimed specifically at easing their transition and encouraging mingling with their peers through icebreaker games and group discussions. I encouraged cultural exchange through events where students from different regions or backgrounds could share their traditions, food, and stories. This helped not only in breaking the ice but also in celebrating diversity within the hostel. Through these events, the freshers began to see the hostel as a place where they could both contribute and learn from each other's experiences. The focus was on fostering friendships rather than just facilitating small talk.

One of the most rewarding aspects of my role was enhancing the cultural environment within the hostel. Jesuit education places a strong emphasis on holistic development, where students are not only encouraged to excel academically but also to grow in their cultural, spiritual, and personal lives. I took this principle to heart, especially when it came to cultural competitions, which were a key aspect of community life in the hostel. When I first took on the role of warden, I noticed that while cultural competitions were a regular feature, they lacked the level of engagement and excitement that could truly bring students together. I realized that there was a significant opportunity to revitalize these competitions and make them more inclusive, engaging, and reflective of the diverse talents within the hostel community. My first step was to rethink the format and structure of the cultural competitions. I named it as "Terra Talents" and introduced competitions in different phases, where students could hone their skills in various art forms such as music, drama, dance, painting, and poetry. The term 'Terra' was then gaining fame as the digital era was moving from giga to terra. Also, the term terra indicating the soil was to encourage the folk arts was liked and much appreciated by Fr Jayapathi, the Rector.

To ensure these competitions were more inclusive and diverse, I introduced categories that would appeal to a wider range of talents. In addition to the usual singing, dancing, and acting, I added events like gaana-maana, photography, videomaking, storytelling, and memes-masters, which attracted students with different skills and interests. This shift allowed us to showcase the full spectrum of creativity within the hostel and gave more students the confidence to participate. Instead of individual performances, I encouraged team-based events where students could come together and combine their unique skills.

To add an extra layer of excitement and make the events feel more like a celebration, I brought in Jesuits and faculty members to serve as judges, ensuring that the competitions had a formal yet friendly atmosphere. The involvement of alumni in Hostel Day also helped students feel more connected to the larger Jesuit community and gave them the opportunity to interact with role models who had once lived in the same hostel.

During Ovations 2014, I found a group of hostel students among the audience dancing offstage and sounding nuisance while there was an actual performance on stage. I found it a kind of disrespectful act from the audience' end.I thought a while and came out with the poster on the noticeboard at LOHO entrance on the same say. It read "DJ Nite _ A platform to dance offstage. All are welcome!" This is how I introduced the much-loved DJ Night, which quickly became one of the most anticipated and enjoyable events in the hostel's social calendar. The idea was to create a space where the stress of

academics could be momentarily set aside, allowing everyone to recharge and foster a sense of camaraderie. I worked closely with the Director, the hostel's student leaders and the administration to ensure that the event aligned with the values of the Jesuit ethos-while it was a fun event, it was important that it also promoted unity and respect for one another. To ensure inclusivity, I made sure that the music selection for the night was diverse, representing various genres and tastes so that everyone could find something they enjoyed. Sebastian and Eric, the student volunteers were my first DJs.

We also organized many counseling sessions with trained professionals and set up an open-door policy, where students could freely come to talk about any concerns they had.

Reflecting on my time at LOHO, I find myself cherishing countless memories that will stay with me forever. It was more than just a job-it was a deeply enriching experience that allowed me to be part of a community of diverse individuals, all of whom were navigating their own journeys of growth and self-discovery. My role allowed me to serve, mentor, and, most importantly, connect with students in ways that were both personal and meaningful.

CHRONOLOGY



Two tower hostel blocks were constructed with 72 rooms.



The construction of the third Block (the balcony hostel) began in January with 28 rooms. The first director, Fr Sauliere S.J., was appointed as in-charge of the hostels, and he served until 1948.



In July, the admission in hostel reached a total of 280. The 4th hostel Block was constructed in November.



There were 11 blocks containing 330 single rooms housing around 550 students.



22 Blocks were refurbished with gardens in the front.



Sauliere Hall was blessed and open for hostellers on 31st July.



An addition of two hostel blocks, new mess rooms, a store cum dispensary and a temporary indoor games facility was constructed.

The student strength of the hostel was around 800.



The guest rooms for students' parents underwent a facelift with renovations.



The grotto of Our Lady of good health at the entrance of the Hostel was erected and inaugurated.



Free midday meal was started for 300 students.



The hosteller's strength rose to 1300.



The fifth block was renovated.

A new lawn was laid in front of Sauliere Hall.



The mess kitchens were renovated with an additional room. The administrative block that was damaged due to the strike of Vardha storm was renovated. The storm had badly hit the hostel and 678 trees were uprooted. Planting of 1000 saplings was done.



'A Block' was inaugurated for the students with best facilities.



The construction of the new building started. 53 CCTVs in the premises were installed and additional water bore wells have also been installed.



Inigo Kiosk was inaugurated for the hostellers with Wi-Fi and reading facility.



The new mess Metro was introduced and Open stage was built at Teak wood garden. At this time, mess facility was expanded to feed 2000 students every day.



30 Mahogany plants were planted near A Block, LOHO 2 and all LOHO-Blocks were refurbished, mess halls where renovated, interlocked pathways were inaugurated, a paver block road laid in front of LICET Hostel, and Sauliere Hall was renovated.



Office Block and guest rooms were fully renovated, and it was named as Andrew Administrative Block. Pathways between Hostel gate and jubilee mess and veg mess were laid and inaugurated. Arrupe Wellness room was opened and made available for the sick students to take rest.



Foundation stone was laid by Fr. Provincial and the site was blessed by Fr. Rector on 4th Feb for the construction of Building for Co-workers. Refurbishments of common block and toilet doors and windows and a complete renovation of the Kitchen area is done. An LED Display was set up in front of Sauliere Hall. Paver block pathway was laid between Sauliere Hall and Line block.

Three Solid years at Loyola

I am an octogenarian, and when I think of LOYOLA, a lot of past college thoughts flash back to me.

Those thoughts still linger in my mind. Each year I spent in college as a Football team custodian for three years, had something lingering in my thoughts.

The first year I joined, we had the experience of seeing all-important figures of our Madras State, and then it was known as that, on one stage at our Bertram Hall. That time the Chinese army occupied our

Indian Northeastern border and a war was going on. That time the whole country showed solidarity to support the nation. Then our college students' council took a bold step to gather our state's important political / academies/actors etc to our college to give lectures to show their solidarity with our nation on one stage. The three very important figures with different political thoughts like Shri Rajagopal Achariar of Swandira Party, Shri K.Kamaraj of Congress, and Shri Annaurai of DMK on one stage were the talk of the town.

The second year passed on peacefully with my participation in our football team fully, as a custodian for all three years, taking part in various matches, and traveling to Bangalore, and Trichy to play against various colleges. We were the champions of Madras City inter-collegiate matches. There used to be African, Malaysian, Chinese, Burmese (now Myanmar) and



Sri-Lankan besides various state students in our team. With such different cultured friends, I learned a lot in both my games and my social participation. Regarding many matches we played on a very important day I could never forget when we lost a very important match against one of our city colleges (I presume may be Pachaiyappas). It was on the same day President Robert Kennedy was assassinated in the USA. In those days there used to be an English Newspaper THE MAIL. It flashed the USA

president's assassination in bold figures on the first page and the last page sports column with big bold letters 'Ilyas lets down Loyola'. Well it was not totally my fault. My football colleagues with their influence with the regular reporters flashed this message.



Third year started and I started concentrating on my studies. That time in Madras politics the DMK party was getting very prominent and at the same time, they started campaigning against Hindi. This kind of anti-Hindi started because our Govt started dumping Hindi as our national Language and made it compulsory in schools. Then the big

brains in DMK party took the policy of catch them young, they made their anti-Hindi campaign among the college students level. It was the first time in LOYOLA history to take part in this kind of political demos. The students in our Hostel started on a small level and took a procession from hostel to the college taking a roundabout college main building. And the talked about decision was to go to classes. However, the leaders who were leading took the procession to the outer gate and continued to the nearby railway station to stop the trains. Then the police intercepted, arrested the whole lot of students and straight took them to Madras central jail. They were there for a few days or a week. Me with my friends as a volunteer outside went to the Jail daily, took food, snacks etc for the student inside. The jail warden was sympathetic towards the young boys and so we were allowed to see individual friends at the visiting time and allowed us to give such things to them.



Well in my 3 years in College, I couldn't forget the 3 legendary principals each year. In my First year, Fr. Seqiura, very pious by himself, was the principal. Every student is subordinate to his requests. In my Second year Fr. Susai who came from St.Xavier's College Palayamkottai where I did my PUC and where he was the principal. At LOYOLA he served as our hostel warden in my first year and was elevated to be the Principal. A great man I couldn't forget because I was under his care for 3 years, twice as principal and as an hostel warden. Both those two great figures passed away in my time at the college and the third year Fr.Francis was the principal who was also very simple and friendly with students.

There are no specific rules on how friendships begin.



The hostel did not confine the students to studies alone. We were taken to areas around the hostel where the public lived in abject poverty. We helped them with food, clothing, and medicine, as part of Hostel's social service initiatives. It helped us understand certain public problems at very young age. Two years of life in Loyola Hostel moulded teenaged students like me into a versatile and responsible citizen.

After classes the evenings were spent playing outdoor or indoor games. The food at the hostel was truly amazing. There were four types of Mess that you could choose from. Vegetarian, non vegetarian, Brahmin and Western. Each of these served a variety of dishes daily. Following dinner we used to sit on the corridors of our rooms and chat for about two hours. Then most students engaged in serious study until late night. Sometimes at midnight a few of us got together to tip off the hostel guards and go out to have late supper or at least a hot cup of tea.

Weekends were packed with hostel activities, otherwise the Malaysian students group got together to go out to the city for all kinds of fun activities. Though the college enforced strict rules at night, managed to watch midnight movies in the city and come back walking after midnight. We tip the guards to open the gates and slowly sneaked into bed. Fortunately none of us ever got caught with these illegal activities.



Some weekends were spent gambling (just small scale). We normally played rummy and these too were done behind closed doors in one of our rooms. Unlike me, Most of my friends were very serious about their college work. I was too engaged watching tennis cricket volleyball and basketball games in which my college team was involved. Though I managed to complete my Pre University exams with good grades it wasn't sufficient to earn me a place in any Medical college in the state. Honestly that wasn't a disappointment for me, because I got to continue either a degree in English Literature at Loyola. It was a rather small class with just 20 students. Nevertheless we had the opportunity to study under English experts like Father Jerome DeSouza - member of the Indian Delegation to the United Nations General Assembly(1949, 1951–1952, 1955, 1957). Don't seem to remember the names of the others.

One of my classmates happened to be the brother of the famous Miss Universe from Thailand Apasra Hongsakula.

The sad thing is after completing the degree some gave me their home address but no contact numbers at all. Unlike now we have our mobile numbers and emails ready to be contacted at any time. Sadly I have lost touch with all of them.


In those four years I experienced the dynamic but very dignified leadership of Fr. Kuriakose. There were couple of huge student unrest/Strike. But the way Fr. Kuriakose handled it was amazing.

Very stern but very respectful and in a problem solving mode of handling issues was exemplary. He was always open to talk to student leaders on any issue. His office was always open and he was accessible (except during admission times).

He was ably assisted by Fr. Casmir Raj, who taught us Statistics. Immediately after finishing B.Com, I was summoned by Fr. Kuriakose, on the recommendation from Fr. Casmir Raj to do a project for him. Father wanted to know the pros and cons and the contrast of the Old marking system and the new Grading system (GPA) introduced as part of the new autonomous model. The new model gave 50% weightage to continuous learning(internal assessment) like attendance, quizzes and periodic tests and 50% for the final examination.

Father gave me a hand written 6 or 7 questions he was looking for answers. At that time there was no computers. They gave me a huge register which had all the marks and grades for the entire 1981 batch of B.A, B.Com., and all the B.Sc. courses. I did the manual counting of all the various scenarios and prepared multiple tables and my conclusions and submitted it to Father in a informal hand written report. He was very pleased and gave me Rs.150 for my work. That was my first earnings of my life and was very glad to pay it back today into the Fr. Kuriakose memorial Scholarship fund.

I am for ever grateful for the lessons I learned from those great Jesuit fathers which helped me shape my life and career.

The Hostel that Built Hundred Homes

When I joined Loyola College in June 1958 as a 16-year - old PUC student, I had little idea of the profound impact this revered institution would have on my life. I entered as a naïve teenager and left as a young man, ready to face the world. Those formative years not only shaped me into the businessman, father, and grandfather I am today but also gifted me some of the happiest and most carefree moments of my life.

My first accommodation, Room No. 74, was a single-occupancy space tucked into a quiet corner of the hostel block. Surrounded by neighbors from Sri Lanka (then Ceylon), Kerala, and various parts of India, the hostel was a melting pot of cultures and youthfulness. Students from diverse backgrounds came together like flowers in a beautiful garland, creating a vibrant community that moulded our young minds. The bonds we formed, free from discrimination and prejudice, are hard to replicate in today's world.

Over time, I moved to Room No. 545 and later to Room No. 204, each marking a different chapter in my Loyola journey. Hostel life was affordable, with a monthly rent of Rs. 16/- and mess charges of Rs. 45/- for vegetarians and Rs. 55/- for non-vegetarians-a stark contrast to today's world where Rs. 90 wouldn't get you much.

The rooms were simple but functional, furnished with a cot, chair, study plank, cupboard, and a mud jar for drinking water. Daily life in the hostel was meticulously organized. Sri Santhappan and his team ensured drinking water was available for all residents, while a cobbler visited every morning to meet our needs.

The wardens played a pivotal role in shaping the hostel's atmosphere. Rev. Fr. Rabina, the warden when I joined, was a man of principle and compassion who dedicated himself too the students' welfare. His passing was deeply felt by the entire community.

Other wardens, like the disciplined Rev. Fr. Anthony and the witty and approachable Rev. Fr. Soosai, also left lasting impressions. I still chuckle when I recall the harmless prank where students tied a donkey to Rev. Fr. Soosai's door-a moment he handled with equal parts amusement and sternness. His phrase, "Kovil Poonai Eesanukku Anjadhu" (The temple cat fears no one, not even the deity), still resonates with me. Together, these wardens were like three facets of the same gem-each shining in their unique way, contributing to the brilliance of Loyola's nurturing environment.



The six hostel mess offered an impressive variety of meals that catered to different tastes. From traditional Tamil vegetarian dishes to spicy non-vegetarian fare for Keralites and Continental cuisine, the food was both diverse and delicious.

Rasam, served in pineapple, lime, and tomato variations, was a standout. I often joke with my wife that even Loyola's hostel food rivaled her cooking-a playful debate that always ends in laughter.

Friday evenings were reserved for entertainment, with English films screened at Bertram Hall and regional movies on special occasions. Loganathan, founder and chancellor of Chidambaram Pillai College for Women in Mannachanallur, Trichy, became a successful entrepreneur managing a chain of estates. Sri Dastagir of Keelakarai made his mark in both education and business as a trustee of the Sadak Trust. Sri Farook Maraikayar, initially managing director of Maraikayar Motors in Pondicherry and Karaikal, later served as the Governor of Pondicherry. M.D. Ilyyas of Kayalpatnam became a respected trustee of Kayalpatnam College and Wavvoo Wajeeha Women's College. state levels, further enhancing the college's reputation.



Sri T V Masillamani, a High Court judge in Chennai, was renowned for his scrupulous honesty and integrity, earning several governmental honors even after retirement alongwith holding esteemed position at Kongu Group of Educations. A.Y.S.P. Benjamin played a pivotal role in establishing a chain of hotels, lodges, and educational institutions.

Clement Elango, a successful IAS Officer, went on to become a prestigious and revered District Collector. Sports also played a significant role in hostel life. LOHO students excelled in football, hockey, volleyball, and tennis. Our hostel boasted six tennis courts, where I even actively played.

Sri S.M.K. Muthaiah and Sri M.S.M.R. Srinivasagam represented Loyola in volleyball at both university and state levels. Reflecting on those years, I realize that Loyola was more than just a university-it was a sanctuary of growth, youth, joy, and camaraderie. Even today, our annual hostel reunions, LOHOS, allow us to relive those golden days and strengthen the bonds we forged back then.

Loyola will forever remain a cherished chapter of my life, one that shaped me in countless ways.







My Tryst with LOHO

Student hostels have an enduring connection with the advancement of social justice in India. Dr. B.R. Ambedkar, the champion of civil rights and political liberties for the oppressed in the country, realized that the opening of schools alone could not advocate for the education of the downtrodden. In 1928, he established the Depressed Classes Education Society to improve their access to and success in education. He appealed to the then Bombay Government to help establish hostels for poor students.

With the government sanctioning a scheme of five hostels, he set up one such Depressed Classes Student's Hostel in Koppadakeri, Dharwad, Karnataka, in 1929. For many years, he personally served as the managing trustee of the society and administered the hostel, with B.H. Varale, his follower, serving as the superintendent. His wife, Ramabai, also served the hostel with great concern.

A couple of years before Ambedkar's initiatives, Thanthai Periyar E.V. Ramasamy's pivotal moment in his struggle against social inequalities came in the form of the Cheranmahadevi Gurukulam incident. The residential school, run by nationalist V.V.S. Iyer with support from the Tamil Nadu Congress Committee, was plagued with rampant caste discrimination, including the segregation of non-Brahmin students during meals at the hostel. Periyar vehemently opposed the practice as a violation of the secular principles that educational and hostel premises should uphold. The Congress party's apathy on the issue was a major factor that led to his resignation. He then started his quintessential Self-Respect Movement in 1925.

These two anecdotes underscore the fact that student hostels have historically been more than just places of residence. They have been crucial battlegrounds in the fight against social injustice in India. They have acted as 'mirrors' of the larger society, reflecting its prejudices and inequalities. However, history has also shown us that hostel have offered spaces for resistance and reform. For marginalized students, they emerged as battlegrounds for equality and empowerment and were conceived to provide a sense of community and solidarity, beyond mere shelter and sustenance. Both Ambedkar and Periyar saw student hostels as essential for navigating the challenges to the education of the underprivileged.

It is more than just a coincidence that Loyola Hostel (LOHO) was born around the same time in 1925, a crucial period in India's social reform movements. Established amidst this fervent atmosphere echoing calls for justice, it inherited a legacy that extended beyond its physical walls. Nurtured by the Jesuit philosophy, the hostel upheld the ideals of inclusivity and justice from its inception. The echoes of Ambedkar and Periyar's struggles resonate within its corridors even today, reminding residents of the often-taken-for-granted justice principles that this hostel embodies. That, in fact, is a testament to the successful integration of those values into the core identity of the institution.

My tryst with LOHO began in 2010 when I joined the hostel as an undergraduate student. Hailing from a humble family background, my exposure to the outside world was quite limited. Of course, the new place did take some getting used to; my first couple of weeks at the hostel were dreadful. But the sheer diversity of students, each with their own unique backgrounds, stories, and aspirations, opened up new avenues for all of us. The time that this campus gave us to heal and better ourselves was really significant. The hostel became my classroom for understanding the complexities of social interactions, the importance of empathy and humanism, and the power of collective action. Fifteen years later, when I returned to LOHO as an Assistant Director in 2024, it was indeed a full circle moment that allowed me to witness the hostel's continued evolution and its enduring commitment to its founding principles. LOHO, in many ways, mirrored the larger societal shifts, yet retained its core values.

The centenary of Loyola Hostel is not just a celebration of its longevity, but also a moment to reflect on its role in shaping the social fabric of our society. It is a testament to the affirming role of student hostels as catalysts for social change. As we look towards the future, we must reaffirm our commitment to upholding the values of equality and justice that our predecessors fought so hard to establish. Loyola Hostel, like the institutions championed by Babasaheb Ambedkar and Thanthai Periyar, must continue to be a beacon of hope—a place where the seeds of social transformation are sown and nurtured, just as what the Jesuits of Loyola call "social engineering." That way, the legacy of these great reformers lives on in the hearts and minds of our generations to come.

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
